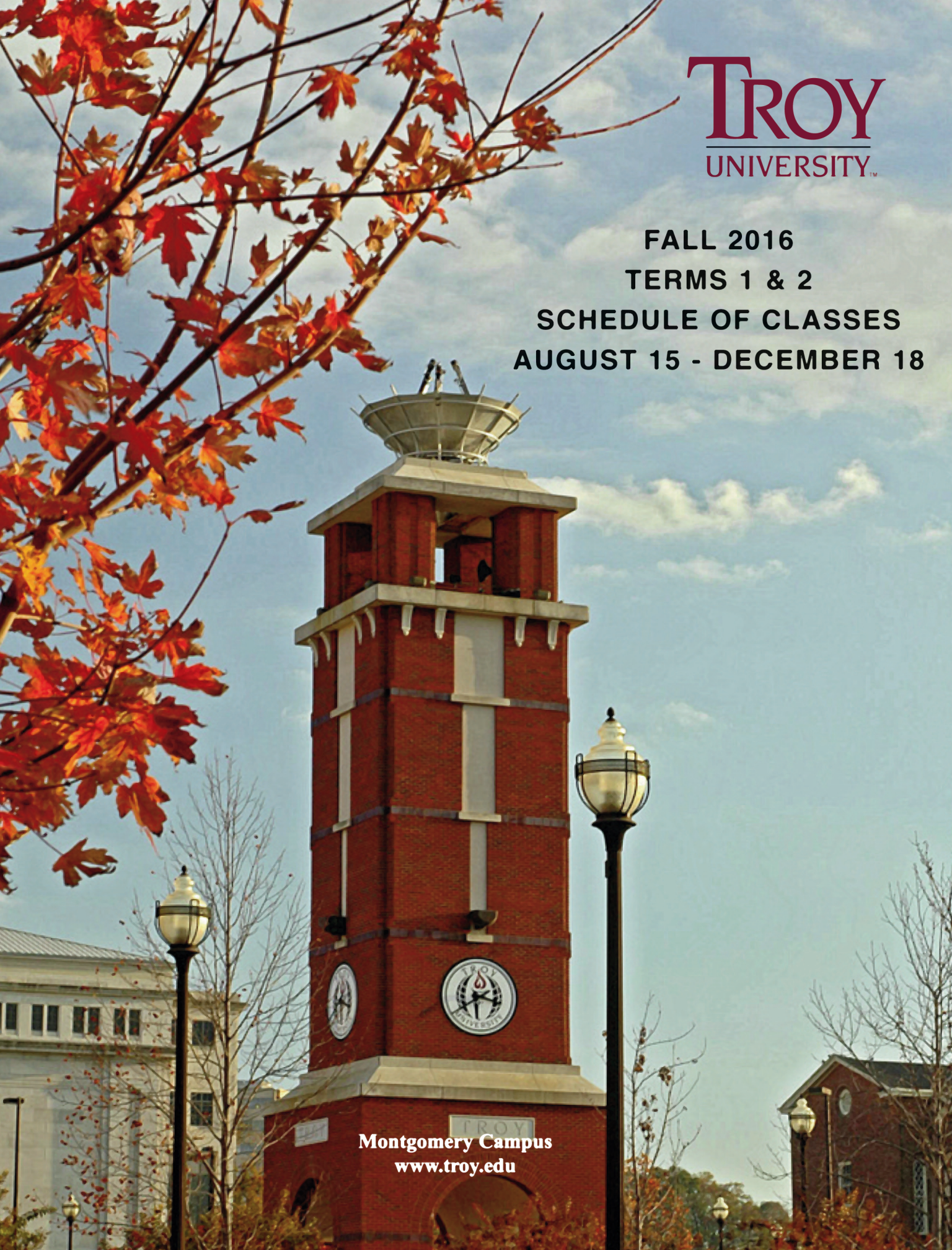

ADMISSION PROCEDURES

FOR STUDENTS NEW TO TROY UNIVERSITY

Troy University realizes that your return to or starting college may be either the result of long-term planning or perhaps a spur-of-the-moment decision. Either way, we're ready to help you get started. Troy University understands that the working adult student has responsibilities other than school. Please contact the Enrollment Office at (334) 241-9506 for assistance with the documents needed for registration, or apply online at (troy.edu/admissions).

FIRST-TIME STUDENTS wishing to enroll in resident courses at Troy University, who meet all admissions requirements and with appropriate documents, may apply for admission to the University in person, but must attend orientation prior to registration. (See Academic Calendar on pages 2-4 for New Student Orientation dates and times). Students applying for financial aid must meet minimum admission status before an award can be made.

STUDENTS FROM ANOTHER INSTITUTION must have their official transcripts from all previous colleges submitted to Troy University Transcripts, 100 University Park, Troy, AL 36082. To assist students in obtaining these documents, Transcript Request Forms are available in the Enrollment Office or you may contact those schools directly. For further information on admission requirements for first-time or transfer students, please call (334) 241-9506 or go to Whitley Hall, Room 411.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS wishing to study at Troy University will need to contact the Center for International Programs for specific admission requirements. NEW STUDENTS JUMPSTART YOUR REGISTRATION

Time is very important for you as you prepare to enroll in college. By starting early, you can save a lot of time and avoid long waits during registration. If you do the following steps, the only thing you'll have to do on registration day is sign up for classes and pay tuition.

\$\$ Financial Aid will only be available to pay for classes at the time of registration if the financial aid process has been completed.

Scheduling Format

ALL courses are on the 9-week format except School of Nursing courses and a few College of Education Practicum courses (See Schedule for exceptions).

Student Admission Requirements

Students' admission documents must be on file and admission requirements satisfied prior to registration. For New Admission Standards, see page 9.

Campus Communications - E-mail - Official Means of Communicating Information to Students

The University has installed a single E-mail system as the University's official link with students. Students should access the site by logging onto (mail.troy.edu) and follow the instructions provided. Students who forward their campus E-mail to other accounts do so at their own risk. The University is only responsible for ensuring the E-mail gets to the student account maintained by the University. **Now, the second point is essential.**

The University uses the campus E-mail system as its official means of notification concerning a variety of administrative issues -- faculty-student communications, billing notices, registration changes, financial aid missing information letters and the like. All billing will only be available via Troy E-mail.

The E-mail notification system will allow the University to provide all students more timely information on important issues.

The University is also providing additional resources for phone services in the Financial Aid Office. This service provides increased access for students to receive answers to financial aid related questions by phone. The phone number for financial aid questions is 1-800-414-5756.

You also now have the ability to sign on to Trojan Web Express enabling you to view your student account balance. Further, if tuition and related fees are due, you

have the ability to pay online through credit card.

Tuition/Fees/Other Charges

Troy University encourages full payment of all tuition and related fees prior to the first day of the term/semester. Failure to pay the balance in full by the payment due date printed in the schedule will result in a late payment fee of \$50.00 as well as a restriction on future class registration and non-release of transcripts. See Academic Calendar on pages 2-4 and/or page 11 for Late Payment Fee Dates.

When a student registers by any means (internet, walk-in, etc.), he/she will be required to pay all tuition and fees.

THERE WILL BE NO LATE REGISTRATION ALLOWED AFTER AUGUST 22, 2016, FOR TERM 1 (T1) AND S SESSION; OCTOBER 24, 2016, FOR TERM 2 (T2).

Financial aid or third party payments that have been processed, loan guaranteed or pell awarded will count toward the student's tuition. Students who are waiting for financial aid or third party payments to be awarded (in process, but not approved) will be required to pay tuition and fees by the payment due date or a late payment fee will apply. **The key point is to get financial aid and third party aid processed early.** Students who have not yet met minimum admission standards will not have Financial Aid awarded; therefore, they should be prepared to pay all tuition and fees at the time of registration.

It is the student's responsibility to manage their financial account online through Trojan Web Express.

Payment reminders will be sent out to the student's email account and delinquent notices will be sent to the mailing address on file. It is the student's responsibility to insure that information in the system is accurate. Payment due dates are published in this schedule as well as posted on the Troy University website.

REFUND PROCEDURES FOR STUDENTS

To receive any refunds from the University, a student must active his or her refund preference with Higher One (Trojan OneCard).

First check the mail for your Refund Selection Kit, arriving in a bright green envelope. This will be sent to the address that you have on file with the University. Once it arrives, simply follow these steps to make your refund preference selection:

1. **Visit TrojanOneCard.com**
2. **Enter your Personal code** (found in your refund selection kit)
3. **Select how you'd like to receive your money**

Your options for receiving your refunds are:

- Deposit to another account (ACH transfer) - Money in two to three business days, once released by the University to Higher One
- Higher One OneAccount - Money deposited to the account the same business day funds are released by the University to Higher One.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. What kinds of money might I receive from Troy?

The most common type of money Higher One disburses to students are funds left over from financial aid awards, loans, or grants after tuition has been paid. Other types of money may include reimbursement for tuition overpayment or a dropped class.

2. How is my money delivered?

Delivery of refund money is a multi-step process. First, TROY draws funds from respective loan and/or grant provider and applies it to your student account. Once this information is verified, it is sent to Higher One. Once the specific refund information is received, it is processed and disbursed according to your selection.

3. How will I know when my money has been sent?

Higher One will send you an email to the address you entered during setup. You can also view the status at TrojanOneCard.com.

Regardless of how students choose to receive their funds, they still need to activate their Trojan OneCard. Students are required to activate their Trojan OneCard and make a refund selection online at (www.TrojanOneCard.com).

STANDARDIZED LAB/COURSE FEES

All Troy University Alabama campuses now charge the same (standardized) laboratory/course fees for classes. The following is a list and explanation of the different types of laboratory/course fees that are now charged. The fees for each class are reflected under the heading Fee (\$) in our schedule of classes beginning on page 26.

Base Fee (Sorrell College of Business): Fee is used to provide enhancements for course delivery and to make improvements for a better learning environment (classroom and lab computer/projection capabilities, specialized course hand out materials, guest lecturers and technology upgrades to various programs/courses within the College of Business). This fee is \$30 for each business class.

Contract Fee (Sorrell College of Business): Fee is paid to Education Testing Service (ETS), the Society of Human Resource Management and to Pearson Education Software for the Major Field Tests and for software packages administered in the various business courses. This fee is \$30.

Course Enhancement Fee: Fee is used to provide enhancements for course delivery and to make improvements for a better learning environment (classroom and lab computer/projection capabilities, specialized course hand out materials or specialized assessment/evaluation materials, guest lecturers, individualized instruction and

technology upgrades to various programs/courses in a particular college). This fee applies to most College of Education classes and some College of Arts and Sciences classes. This fee ranges from \$5 - \$50 depending on the class.

Course Testing Fee: Fee is used to purchase, on behalf of the student, specialized tests and/or testing materials associated with a particular course. This fee applies to only a few business classes and ranges from \$30 - \$80 depending on the class.

Lab Fee: Fee is used to upgrade and maintain lab equipment in specific courses and/or labs within the college department for supporting particular degree programs. This fee applies to various arts and sciences classes to include biology labs, chemistry labs, computer science classes and science labs. It also applies to some business classes to include information system classes and some communication and fine arts classes. This fee ranges from \$15 - \$180 depending on the class.



Delayed Disbursing of Financial Aid, Refunds and Book Purchases

During the first few days of the academic term/semester, the University allows students to make free course schedule adjustments which results in course load changes, lab requirement changes and so forth. In essence, the student's schedule is in a state of flux which also impacts key administrative functions such as financial aid, scholarships, grants and loans.

To accommodate these student-driven changes, the University will wait until the end of the free course schedule adjustment period to begin assessing charges for tuition and fees. Because of this free period for course adjustments, it will be the second week before the University credits financial aid to student accounts. Any remaining funds (credit balances) due to you will be provided after financial aid disburses. Students anticipating credit balances from financial aid for living expenses will need to plan for this delayed disbursement.

New borrowers must complete a Master Promissory Note (MPN) with our guarantor (KHEAA) before lenders will release funds to the University.

For students who rely on financial aid and/or have sponsor authorization for textbook purchases, book charging will be available in the bookstore on July 25, 2016, for Term 1 (T1); September 26, 2016 for Term 2 (T2). See pages 38-39 for online textbook information.

Students who have not met minimum admission status will not have financial aid awarded and should be prepared to self-pay for textbooks.

Those students with their financial aid already processed will be able to register with assurance that all administrative processes are in good order. Remember, **if you pre-register and apply for financial aid, you will be responsible for all charges unless you properly cancel your registration, regardless of whether or not your financial aid is approved or not approved.** Begin now to get your 2016/2017 FAFSAs submitted to the U.S. Department of Education by going to our financial aid website at (www.troy.edu/financialaid) so your funding will be in place when the tuition and fees are due. Also, be sure to meet all admission requirements as soon as possible to avoid financial aid delays.

ADMISSION STANDARDS

CLASSES REQUIRING PLACEMENT TESTS - Students enrolling in ENG 1100, ENG 1101, MTH 1100, MTH 1105, MTH 1110, or MTH 1112 must have completed any required placement tests or be enrolled in the appropriate prerequisite course or have successfully completed the prerequisite course with a "C" or better prior to enrolling in any of the above courses.

MILLER ANALOGIES TEST SCORES - Graduate programs using the Miller Analogies Test scores for unconditional admissions require a minimum score of 385.

NO DE-REGISTRATIONS - Troy University does not remove students from their courses when students fail to make appropriate payments. When a student registers by any means (internet, walk-in, etc.), the

student will owe 100% tuition and fees unless he/she officially drops or withdraws by the deadline to make free course schedule adjustments as posted in the course schedule. PROFICIENCY PROFILE TESTING FOR UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Based upon the criteria of your enrollment at Troy University, you may be required to take the Proficiency Profile Test. The Proficiency Profile Test assesses four core skill areas-critical thinking, reading, writing and mathematics. The Proficiency Profile Test is composed by Educational Testing Services of Princeton, NJ and is a nationally normed test used by Troy University to assess our General Studies Courses. These results are used to fulfill a SACS requirement and are important to the continuation of SACS accreditation. This is a system-wide requirement, necessary for our SACS accreditation. WHO TAKES THE TEST?

1. Bachelor's degree students once 60 credit hours have been earned.
2. Associate degree students once 45 credit hours have been earned.

Car Tag Scholarship (Undergraduate)

Amount: \$1,000.00 (awarded for one year only and will be awarded in the fall Term 1 or Term 2 and is non-renewable).

Availability: One award to first time student (entering freshman, adult learners, transfer students) beginning each fall Term 1 or Term 2.

Criteria: Entering freshman must be admitted by the scholarship deadline and have a 3.0 overall GPA on high school course work and be able to demonstrate a record of community service. Adult learners/transfer students are required to have a 3.0 cumulative GPA on all college work. Applicant or family members are required to be a paid member of the Troy University Alumni Association for one year and possess a Troy University car tag.

Deadline: May 1

High School Achiever Scholarship (Undergraduate)

Amount: The scholarship will apply only to tuition and will cover only that tuition (up to the maximum cost of one three-hour course).

Availability: Ten awards to new graduating high school seniors beginning each fall in Term 1 or Term 2.

Criteria: The student must be admitted by the scholarship deadline and have a 3.0 overall GPA on high school course work and an ACT score of 20 or higher or SAT score of 910. Students will need to be nominated by their school counselor and will need to submit one letter of recommendation from persons other than a family member or school counselor.

Deadline: March 31

Jane and Ned Varner Memorial Scholarship (Undergraduate)

Amount: \$1,000.00 (One-half of the scholarship award will be issued each Fall and Spring).

Availability: One award to an undergraduate student beginning each fall (Term 1 or Term 2) and is renewable for the spring (Term 3 or Term 4).

Criteria: Applicants must have a minimum overall 3.0 GPA and must meet unconditional admissions requirements at TROY Montgomery by the start of the term. Awardees who maintain at least a 3.0 GPA can renew the scholarship one time for the Spring (Term 3 or Term 4).

Awardees cannot receive another TROY scholarship concurrently with the Varner scholarship. A letter of appreciation to the donor from the awardee is required.

Deadline: July 30

New Student Scholarship (Undergraduate)

Amount: The scholarship will apply only to tuition and will cover only that tuition (up to the maximum cost of one three-hour course).

Availability: Twenty awards to new students beginning each fall (Term 1 or Term 2) and is renewable for the spring (Term 3 or Term 4) (recipient must maintain a 2.5 GPA each semester).

Criteria: The student must be admitted by the scholarship deadline and have a 2.5 overall GPA on high school or previous college course work. Minimum transfer hours from college are 24 semester hours.

Returning Student Scholarship (Undergraduate)

Amount: The scholarship will apply only to tuition and will cover only that tuition (up to the maximum cost of one three-hour course).

Availability: Thirty awards to returning students beginning each fall (Term 1 or Term 2) and is renewable for the spring (Term 3 or Term 4) (recipient must maintain a 2.5 GPA each semester).

Criteria: The student must have a 3.0 or higher overall GPA and earned a minimum of 24 semester hours.

Deadline: July 30

Returning and New Graduate Student Scholarship (Scholarship Eligibility Requires U.S. Citizenship.)

Amount: The scholarship will apply only to tuition and will cover only that tuition (up to the maximum cost of one three-hour course).

Availability: Twenty awards to new and/or returning graduate students beginning each fall (Term 1 or Term 2) and is renewable for the spring (Term 3 or Term 4) (recipient must maintain a 3.5 GPA each semester).

For freshmen - high school grade point average of at least 2.50; for transfers - cumulative grade point average of at least 2.50; for GED recipients - minimum score of 550. Successfully complete 18 credits per year, beginning at the time of enrollment and ending no later than five years from the start date.

Additional Criteria (Graduate):

Be unconditionally admitted to a graduate degree program. If necessary for the field of study, the applicant must be admitted to the program. Successfully complete 15 semester credits per year, beginning at the time of enrollment and ending no later than two years from the start date.

Horizon Scholarship (Undergraduate and Graduate)

- Amount:* The scholarship is equal to one three-hour course awarded after completing first term in academic good standing and the final six hours of TROY degree for graduate students and final nine hours of TROY degree for undergraduate students.
- Availability:* 1,000 awards available: 800 undergraduate, 200 graduate
- Criteria:* Must submit application for admission. Submit Horizon Scholarship Application prior to the start of the semester/term. Student must be enrolled in the term (9 week) format and has not received other institutional-funded scholarship during the time of attendance.

Additional Criteria (Undergraduate):

Unconditional admission to the University. For freshmen - high school grade point average of at least 2.50; for transfers - cumulative grade point average of at least 2.50; for GED recipients - minimum score of 550. Successfully complete 18 credits per year, beginning at the time of enrollment and ending no later than five years from the start date.

Additional Criteria (Graduate):

Be unconditionally admitted to a graduate degree program. If necessary for the field of study, the applicant must be admitted to the program. Successfully complete 15 semester credits per year, beginning at the time of enrollment and ending no later than two years from the start date.

Military and Family Member Scholarship

This scholarship has been established to recognize the service of U.S. Active, Reserve, and National Guard members by offering a discounted tuition rate to members, their spouses, and dependent children. The scholarship reduces tuition to \$250 per credit hour at both the undergraduate and graduate level.

Eligibility Criteria: The student must meet the following:

1. Must be active, guard, or reserves or spouse or dependent of same
2. Must be an applicant or enrolled.
3. Scholarship application must be received 2 weeks prior to start of term for which applying for the scholarship.
4. Must submit completed verification of spouse or dependent status form to scholarship coordinator NLT 2 weeks prior to start of term. Re-validation is required each year NLT July 31st.
5. Must maintain a 2.0 cumulative GPA at undergrad level or 3.0 cumulative GPA at graduate level.

Award will vary based on number of credit hours registered for each term. Award cannot exceed credit hours required for student's initial degree program. Can only be used toward one degree at each level (i.e. cannot be used for a second associates, bachelors, etc.).



PLACEMENT, MAKE-UP AND ONLINE TESTING

EXAMINATIONS REQUIREMENTS

To help you determine your current ability and to assist you in assuring your future academic success, Troy University uses a combination of ACT scores and placement tests to determine the courses for which you are best prepared to enroll.

Students who plan to register for ENG 1100, *ENG 1101, MTH 1100, MTH 1105, MTH 1110, or MTH 1112 must complete a placement test and meet the minimum score, present ACT/SAT scores or successfully complete the appropriate prerequisite course prior to registration.

* Students who have an ACT English (ACT-E) score of 20 or higher **are not required** to take the Compass English Placement Test for ENG 1101.

The **Compass Math Test** can be taken once every 30 days. The **Compass English Test** can be taken once every 30 days.

Transient students are required to meet course prerequisites and to take the appropriate placement tests.

Students must provide a picture ID before they are administered any test.

TESTING LOCATION AND SCHEDULE

Placement, make-up and online course tests are administered at the Center for Student Success located in Whitley Hall, Room 500. Instructors' tests received in the Center after 3:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday will not be available for students until the next business day. Additionally, instructors' tests received after 9 a.m. on Friday will not be available until Monday of the next week.

PLACEMENT TESTING

DOWNTOWN PARKING (Get a map at Whitley Hall, front desk) **Students are not allowed to park in campus lots and decks to go to work downtown.**



There are several lighted, security patrolled parking lots and two parking decks near Whitley Hall. You must have a current ID card and parking permit (decal) to park in campus lots and decks. All students must pay for their parking permits in the Student Financial Services office, Whitley Hall, Room 216. A parking permit must be obtained from the Whitley Hall Lobby, Information Desk. Students must have a current student ID card, current class schedule and the receipt from the Student Financial Services office in order to obtain a parking permit. There will be a \$75 fee (\$37.50 with Trojan Cafe fee) to obtain a parking permit and \$15 for any additional parking permits. Anyone showing proof of a Troy University tag on their vehicle will receive a free parking decal for each vehicle with a Troy tag.

Please drive carefully and pay attention to signs.

Previous year's parking permits expire at the end of summer session each year. New parking permits are available at the beginning of each fall semester (Term 1). **To avoid parking fines or towing at owners expense, please park in authorized parking spaces only and have a current parking permit displayed on the outside of your drivers' side rear window.**

HOLIDAYS - Troy University observes the following holidays/breaks. Fall Semester (T1 & T2) has four holidays/breaks when classes will not meet: Labor Day (September 5, 2016); Veterans Day (November 11, 2016); Fall Break for S Session/Semester Classes Only (November 21-22, 2016); Thanksgiving Holidays (November 23-27, 2016). There are no required make-up sessions for these holidays/breaks.

ID CARD PROCEDURES - ID cards are mandatory for all students. Students must go to the Whitley Hall Lobby, Information Desk, to receive a student ID card. In order to receive a student ID card or to update an existing card, students must show their current registration form. Student ID cards are lifetime cards and should not be destroyed! A replacement fee of \$15 will be charged for student ID cards. ID cards will be issued at the Whitley Hall Lobby, Information Desk, Monday - Thursday, 7 a.m. - 11 p.m. and Fridays, 7 a.m. - 6 p.m. (facility hours vary between terms/semesters). ID cards are required to check out books at the Troy

University Library, and to be authorized to park in downtown parking lots. Staff and campus police may request to see a student's ID card to verify student status. Students must show current ID card when requested (mandatory for bookstore charges and entry into computer labs).

THE IMPACT OF DROPS AND WITHDRAWALS ON FEDERAL FINANCIAL AID - If you are receiving financial aid and drop or withdraw after the refund date and before completing 60% of the term/semester, federal regulations require the University to return a prorated amount of your grant and/or loan to the Department of Education. The Business Office in turn, bills the student for the amount returned. Payment of miscellaneous fees, books, reduction of financial aid and the return of financial aid already awarded may be involved. Financial Aid students who drop or withdraw are required to notify the Financial Aid Office, Whitley Hall, Room 208, to determine if your aid will be canceled and, if so, the procedures on how to appeal for reinstatement of your aid.

INTENT TO GRADUATE - The Intent to Graduate forms for undergraduate and graduate students are available online ONLY. Filling out and submitting the Intent to Graduate Form is the official notice to the Registrar's Office that a student plans to complete his or her degree requirements within a particular time period. Deadlines for submitting the Intent to Graduate Forms are posted in this Schedule's Academic Calendar (pages 2-4). A \$60 filing fee will be applied to the student's account within three working days after completion of the Intent to Graduate Form. This fee must be paid within the deadline for which the student is filing. Students can access their accounts through

(troy.edu/webexpress.htm). If this fee is not paid by the date of commencement, a hold will be placed on your account and your diploma will not be released.

TROY UNIVERSITY GRADUATION RATE - In compliance with Public Laws 101-542 and 102-26, the graduation rate for first-time, full-time undergraduate students who entered in the fall of 2008 is 36%. The transfer-out rate for this same group is 34%.

TUITION AND BUSINESS PROCEDURES - It is the responsibility of the student to see that all tuition and fees are paid. Financial Aid must be guaranteed at the time of registration for the student to be classified as a financial aid recipient. Financial aid recipients are responsible for the balance of tuition and fees not paid by their award. Past due indebtedness will be submitted to a collection agency. Additional collection fees will be added to the indebted amount.

Notice: You may not enroll for future terms/semesters if you are indebted to the University. The current term/semester must be paid-in-full at the time of registration.

TUITION REFUND POLICY - Students who drop or withdraw before the Free Course Schedule Adjustment period will receive a full tuition and lab refund (less miscellaneous fees). No refunds of tuition are made after the Free Course Schedule Adjustment period published in the schedule, unless the drop or withdrawal is documented to show reasons beyond the student's control. Adequacy of documentation is at the discretion of the University. The Business Office requires up to 30 days to process all refunds (See page 7 for Student Refund Procedures).

Telling your instructor or telephoning a university official does not constitute an official drop or withdrawal. A “DROP FORM” is used when a student wishes to drop one or more, but not all courses. A course correction may be made through the last day to make free course schedule adjustments without owing full tuition/fees. A “WITHDRAWAL FORM” is used when the student discontinues attending ALL classes.

DROP OR WITHDRAWALS (Free Course Schedule Adjustment - Financial Responsibilities) - The Registration fee (\$25 per Term or \$50 per Semester) is non-refundable. A \$30 per course drop fee, or \$50 withdrawal fee will be charged after the last day to make free course schedule adjustments without owing full tuition/fees. All tuition and fees must be paid if a drop or withdrawal is submitted after the above dates.

FINANCIAL AID STUDENTS - Federal regulations require Troy University to return a prorated amount of the financial aid to the Department of Education for students withdrawing after above refund dates and before completing 60% of the term/semester. The student will be responsible for paying the amount returned to the University.

Students requesting retroactive drops or withdrawals must provide appropriate documentation within six months after the end of that term/semester to the Associate Dean of Student Services for approval.

GRADE STATUS AT TIME OF DROP OR WITHDRAWAL - Students who drop or withdraw from a course(s) BEFORE the last day for drop/withdrawal with non-punitive academic grade will not be charged academically for hours attempted; **however, full tuition and fees will be charged.** Students who drop or withdraw from a course(s) AFTER **September 23, for Term 1 (T1); November 25, for Term 2 (T2); and October 31, for S Session/Nursing**, will be charged academically with hours attempted (will receive grade as earned) in the computation of grades for these courses and for the overall grade point average. If there are documented circumstances beyond a student's control, these documents must be presented to the Associate Dean of Student Services for review and approval for an exception to the above policies. Contact the Student Services office for specific information.

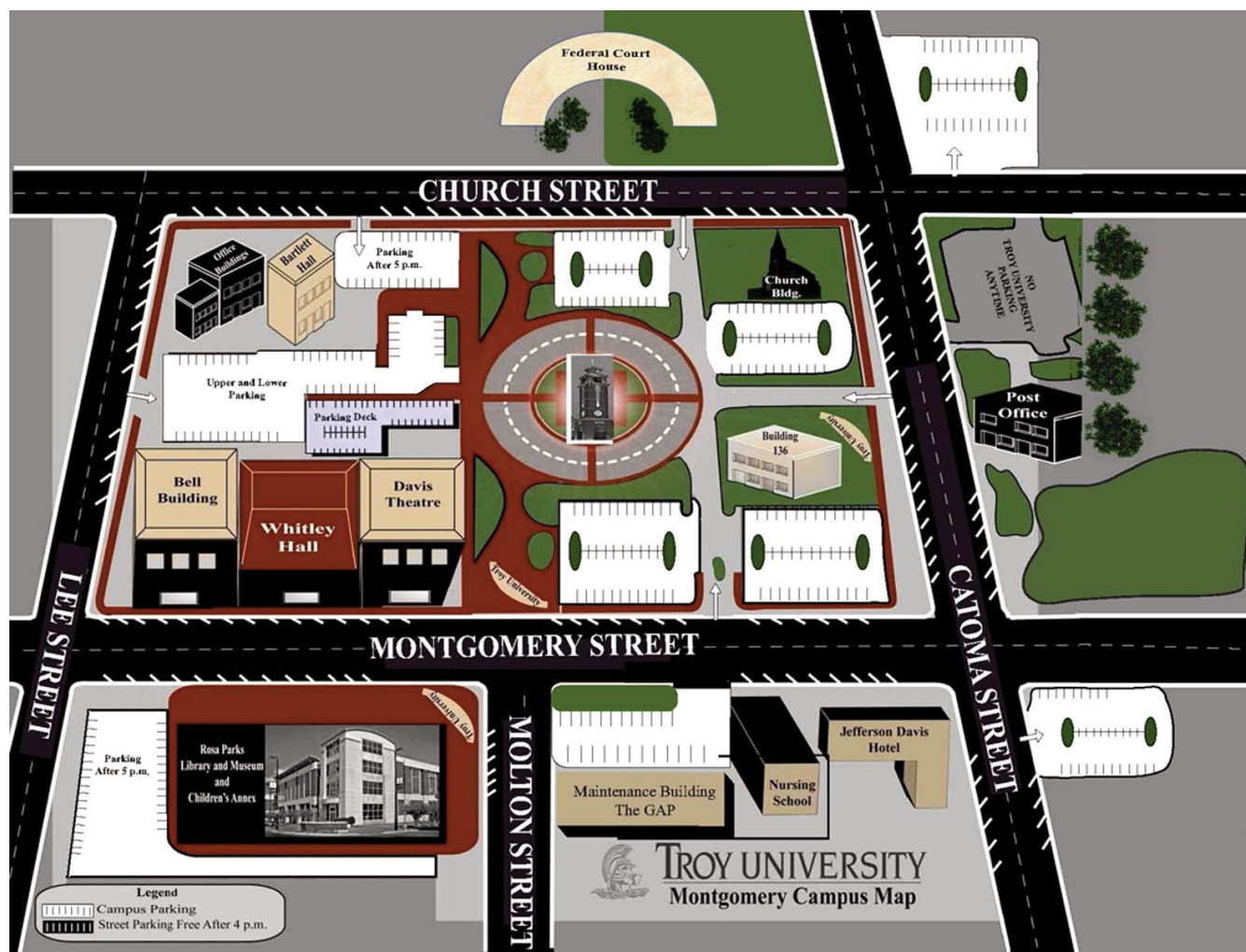
